AARP tax aide counselors will be at the Pennsauken Free Public Library on Wednesdays and Thursdays, starting on Feb. 6 and continuing through April 11. Please note the times for tax preparation have changed for 2019. Tax preparation hours at the Library will be from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

To make an appointment online, visit AARP.org, click on the tax aide site location link and choose the Pennsauken Library. Fill in the information requested, pick the date and time preferred, and click "Submit." A confirmation e-mail will be sent immediately afterwards. If the date and time requested are not available, individuals have the choice to be waitlisted. Canceling or rescheduling appointments can be done online as well at AARP.org. The new AARP appointment management app goes live on Tuesday, Jan. 15.

At the beginning of this month, two new voices joined the governing body representing the people of Pennsauken. Jessica Rafeh and Marco DiBattista were elected to Township Committee in November's general election; and the two are extremely eager to serve their community.

"I'm really excited for this opportunity and I'm humbled by it," says Rafeh. "I appreciate that the residents of Pennsauken believed in Marco and I; we're ready to make a difference."

"As a guy who spent his whole life in town, I'm ready to help guide the direction of Pennsauken and help lead this community into the future," adds DiBattista. "It's a great opportunity and Jess and I are excited to get started."

Jessica moved from Venezuela to the United States at a very young age and has lived in Pennsauken for nearly 20 years with her husband, Husan. A New Year, A New Trash Collection Company In Pennsauken

For the first time in over 20 years, Pennsauken residents will have their trash picked up by a different trash collection company.

Approximately every five years, the Township is required to go out to bid for pricing on trash collection. This cycle, South Jersey Sanitation Company, Inc. was awarded the contract for 2019-2021, with two additional one-year options. Although the collection company is changing, the days that you are serviced for your trash, recycling, white goods and yard debris remain the same. The only difference here is the company performing the work. The trash rules and regulations will also remain the same. In

My daddy's letting me have my own article this month! He wanted me to let you know about dog licenses. I'm a dog. I have a license. I'm kind of an expert.

According to something you humans call a "codebook," any dog that lives in Pennsauken, is seven months old or older, and has a set of permanent teeth. needs a license. And while it's a little metal tag that we dogs wear around our collar, it's a pretty big deal.

Dog licenses aren't just for keeping track of all the awesome puppies big and small that live in town; they can be used

to help find your favorite four-legged friend if they get out of the backyard.

Dog licenses are just \$12 for a dog that's been spayed or neutered, or \$15 if your pet is "au naturale." That's not too pricey. And the fee doesn't just go to process the application. A portion goes to Pennsauken's doggie "trust fund," which helps pay for things like free vaccination clinics.

It's still not too late to get a license for your dog. In fact, you have until the first Monday of February before you'll be charged a \$10 late fee. So don't wait! Your furry kid will thank you for it.







Tran, Chiem Accepted To Ivy League Schools

Last month, two seniors at Pennsuken High School were recognized for being accepted into Ivy League schools. Next fall, Davis Tran will attend the University of Pennsylvania; and Ngan Chiem will head to Princeton University.

"We're excited for this opportunity to recognize two students that represent an extremely talented student body," said Billy Snyder, coordinator of student services for Pennsauken Public Schools.

Ivy League schools are recognized for the quality of education they provide. Of the hundreds of thousands of students who are applying to colleges, many don't even consider Ivy League schools. Almost every incoming freshman was in the top 10 percent of their class, had GPA scores at 4.0 or higher, and SAT scores of 1400 and above.

The University of Pennsylvania received 40,413 applications for admission to the Class of 2021. Of those applicants, 3,757, or 9.3 percent were offered admission. Ninety-seven percent of the students admitted for fall 2017 came from the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class. In comparison, Princeton University accepted 1,941 students, or just 5.5 percent of the 35,370 who applied.

"The admission process to an Ivy League school is not simple; you're competing against other high quality applicants," added Snyder. "It takes extremely talented, dedicated students, as well as a really successful team, to put it all together."

Tran, who has a cumulative GPA of 4.33 and is ranked third in his class, was accepted in the University of Pennsylvania's School of Engineering and Applied Sciences and will be studying bioengineering.

"Biology has always fascinated me, but in the long term, I've been looking to go into regenerative medicine, especially stem cell therapy," explained Tran, who credited his science classes at Pennsauken High School for creating an interest in this field of study. "Bioengineering can provide that."

Tran is accomplished both in and out of the classroom. He is the co-founder of the Pennsauken High School Peer Mentorship Club and president of the Science National Honor Society. Davis was selected as one of the two delegates sponsored at PHS to attend the American Legion Jersey Boys State last summer and was selected for the Governor's STEM Scholar Program for 2018. He is

co-president of the school's Junior Classical League, vice president of the Leo Club, and a member of the National Honor Society. He is also a member of the New Jersey Science League. In addition, Tran is a founding member and snare drummer at ENCORPS DCI DRUM CORPS and is currently the drumline captain for the Apache High School Marching Band.

Chiem, who has a 4.5 GPA, an SAT score of 1510, and is ranked first in her class, will be majoring in international politics the Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs at Princeton University.

"I'm interested in learning how the world behind the curtain works. How people in power use their power to effect change or stagnate a population of people," explained Ngan. "At PHS, I learned how to love learning; and so this curiosity from subjects like French and history, anything I could get my hands on to kind of understand how the world works, fosters into my aspirations to become a writer and a journalist."

School District Tests Gym Mats For Mercury, Levels Well Within Safe Limits

Last month, the Pennsauken School District sent students home with a letter stating that rubberized gym mats in several schools were proactively tested to identify if they had unsafe levels of Mercury.

"In an effort to comply with the standards of Mercury airborne exposure levels of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Minnesota Department of Health (MDH), which is a widely used secondary testing standard, Pennsauken School District, as a precautionary measure, is taking an extremely proactive approach to investigating the levels of Mercury in rubberized gym floors," said Dr. Ronnie Tarchichi, superintendent, Pennsauken School District, in his letter to parents and guardians. "The Pennsauken School District will

take every precaution to keep our students, staff members, and stakeholders safe."

Information provided by the Pennsauken School District stated that many schools throughout the U.S. that were constructed between the 1960s and the late 1990s had rubberized polyurethane gym floors installed for both safety and comfort. Over the past year or so, school

districts have identified that many of these rubberized floors began to emit mercury vapor as they age. As a proactive response to this issue, Pennsauken School District made the decision to conduct a survey of these gym floors in their schools.

Based on preliminary, independent testing by a certified industrial hygienist, the District reported that gym mats at Pennsauken High School, Pennsauken Intermediate School, and both Delair and Fine Elementary Schools had Mercury levels well below acceptable thresholds. No other schools in the District were affected.

The Pennsauken School District administration and staff offer our sincerest condolences to Robin and Josephine's family, friends, colleagues, and students.



In a previous article, we wrote about always reflecting on the things we've done in the past to see if they are worth repeating for the future. Understanding where we've been and whether it worked only helps to ensure that our next moves are taking us in the right direction. Looking back at 2019, I can honestly say that there is not one thing that I would change about what we did. There were a few bumps in the road, but all in all, it is all worth doing over again.

The things we put in place are solid, sustainable, and worth repeating for as long as time will allow.

The one thing that brought us the most success was our concerned citizens. Some called or e-mailed; others stopped by; a few even took the time to talk over coffee and share their ideas and information with us. There is no greater gift than the insight of the concerned citizens that take time out of their own crazy and busy lives to share their thoughts and ideas with you.

Here are some ideas that were shared

with us. They've been either already been put in place or we will be trying to execute them this year.

One concerned citizen talked to us about our grass cutting program. He suggested that if we were to organize the grass cutting schedule by neighborhood instead of by individual property, residents would see a larger and faster improvement right in their own section of town. This approach also allows the contractor to complete their work faster because they would not be spending so much time driving from property to property. So this year, we are going to try and organize our grass cutting schedule by neighborhood. We hope this will have a greater impact throughout the town, ensuring that the residents feel better about their neighborhood.

Another resident called about a tree problem on an empty lot near their house. If the tree fell, it would not have a direct impact on their property. But they were very concerned about possible damage to either a car or a passerby. We took some steps to get the owners and or property maintenance companies of vacant properties or empty lots to assess the condition and placement of any trees on their property. This gives owners an

opportunity to remove a potential liability before anyone got hurt or any other property was damaged; it also would have a greater impact on the removal of dead trees throughout the town. The owner of that particular property with the tree was contacted and the tree was taken down. Mission accomplished!

Another idea came from our Shade Tree Commission. It was brought up that while dead trees are being removed, they aren't being replaced with a new, live tree. The Commission asked if there was any way we could have the owners of vacant properties replace these potentially dangerous trees with a new one in a safer spot. We are taking a look at the idea by researching state statutes and other local municipal ordinances for anything that might point us in that direction.

These are just some of the ideas that have been shared. There have been so many more calls and e-mails regarding issues with particular properties that have helped us to make improvements all over town and to hopefully make our neighbors feel safe.

Your thoughts matter; your ideas are being considered; and you are always our first priority. We've made progress, but there are still houses that need our attention. As we move forward, we take great care in ensuring that we place each one in the program that will get it taken care of the quickest and with as little expense as possible. We will never reach the "zero" mark, but we will continue to work hard on controlling the things we can and pushing back on the responsible parties to do their part in keeping our neighborhoods clean and safe.

We are proud of our accomplishments in 2018, but none are more important than the involvement of our concerned citizens. Your involvement, thoughts, and ideas are key to keeping things going in the right direction.



I visited the new Checkers. located at 6720 S. Crescent Blvd., with none other than Frank Sinatra, All Around Pennsauken's editor. This gave us the chance to try a better variety of items off the menu.

I opted for a tradition Checkers burger and fries with a frozen Kool-Aid, Frank got the fish sandwich and fries with a chocolate milkshake. We also shared some chicken bites. The there is only edge counter seating, but there are several tables available for fair weather dining outside on their patio; these tables are wheelchair accessible and easy to get to.

My burger was tasty. It was well cooked and had the usual accompaniments of lettuce and tomato; but had red onions as opposed to white onions, which I liked. It wasn't huge, but it was filling. The seasoned fries were crispy and didn't disappoint. The frozen Kool-Aid was awesome. I got blue raspberry, but it wasn't too sweet and is the perfect treat, particularly in the summer.

The fish sandwich was not your typical fast food item. It was nice and flaky: there was just the right amount of breading, which didn't take away from the amount of fish there was. The milkshake was thick, but good. There are four different flavors offered: chocolate, vanilla,

While we ate, Frank spotted some signage behind the counter, indicating service times that the Checkers team strives for. There was a 150 second limit on each order; and we found that they more than achieved this service goal. Checkers also offers a nice selection of beef and chicken options. The chicken bites were good. I can confidently say that my three-year-old would love them. They're crunchy and you get a good amount in each order. You can order them alone or as a combo meal, just like any other item on the menu. They also come with one sauce per order; additional sauces are extra. They also offer non-traditional fast

food items, like hot dogs, as well as chicken wings in a variety of flavors.



Individuals can participate by adopting a hydrant nearest their homes. This is also a great opportunity for scouts, civic groups or individuals looking to earn *community service hours*.



Five Tips To Prevent Frozen Pipes

- Keep the garage door closed (especially if the garage is attached to the house).
- During a deep freeze, keep the thermostat set to the same temperature day and night. Lowering the thermostat could cause pipes to freeze.
- If you're going out of town, drain the water system completely. Do this by shutting off the main valve and letting all the faucets in the home run until the system is empty (no more running water comes out of the tap).
- Check for and fill in holes or cracks in exterior walls and foundations to prevent cold air from coming into the walls.
- And remember to insulate and protect your water meter!



Estimated Meter Readings

The MPWC estimates meter readings when we are unable to access your property to obtain an actual meter reading, or when your remote device is not functioning properly. Estimated readings can result in higher-than-usual water bills. When reviewing your quarterly bill, look for estimated meter readings. If your meter reading has

Making A New Year's Resolution To Recycle Better

In recent months, you may have read or seen items in the news about important changes in recycling. China is the largest purchaser of plastic waste in the world. But in the beginning of last year, they banned the import of this type of plastic. In addition, China is refusing recyclables from the United States that exceeds .5 percent contamination. That's not a very big margin of error. As a result, recycling guidelines have become more specific about what can - and what can't - be placed in your yellow recycling can.

With the start of a brand new year, Pennsauken is strongly encouraging residents to become better recyclers. Here is some information that should help you make sure that what you put out for recycling actually belongs there.

The majority of what you're already recycling is still accepted: glass jars and bottles; aluminum and tin cans; plastics that have the number 1 or 2 on them; and paper products including newspapers, white paper, cardboard, envelopes, magazines, etc.

Here's where it gets a little more complicated. The glass jars, aluminum cans, plastic bottles, etc. all need to be cleaned out of any contaminants before you place them in your recycling can. That means the empty can of peanut butter, your gallon of milk, or your can of tomato paste needs to be completely washed out. It also means that paper products – including your Friday night pizza box – can't be stained with grease or caked on food. So if that pizza box has grease and cheese, or you can't get out the dried up chocolate fudge in the jar, it actually belongs in the trash.

There are also a few things that you may have tried to recycle in the past that actually don't belong there. Coat hangers, pots and pans, drinking glasses, and the like are actually trash. More importantly, any and all types of plastic bags are NOT recyclable in any way, shape or form. You can't even place your recyclables in a trash bag. Plastic bags clog up sorting machines; and any costs associated with clearing them are being passed on to municipalities and taxpayers.

665-5959 ext 7 and leave a message with your name and phone number. An AARP tax aide counselor will get back to you in 24-48 hours to answer your questions and set up an appointment.

The Pennsauken Free Public Library will be accepting a limited number of walk-ins for tax preparation, but only on a first come, first served basis. The Library's front desk will have numbered cards to give out, up to the maximum number of tax payers allowed for that day.

When you come in to have your taxes prepared at the Library, you must bring: a government-issued photo ID for all taxpayers; Social Security cards (not Medicare cards) for each person whose name is on the tax return; ALL tax docutax return, whether prepared by AARP

Vaccination, Awareness Needed To Prevent Spread Of Measles

In October of last year, the New Jersey Department of Health began working with local health officials to investigate an ongoing outbreak of measles. As of December 12, 2018, 19 confirmed cases of measles have been linked to the outbreak, all located in Ocean and Passaic counties. And based on data provided from the Centers of Disease Control and Prevention, as of December 1, 2018, 292 individual cases of measles have been confirmed in 26 states and the District of Columbia.

According to the CDC, measles symptoms appear about seven to 14 days after infection. Symptoms include a high fever,

cough, runny nose, and red, watery eyes After a few days, tiny, white spots often appear inside the mouth. The tell-tale rash breaks out, often starting at the hairline and spreading to the neck, torso, arms, legs, and feet. At this point, a person's fever may reach more than 104 degrees.

Measles is highly contagious and spreads through coughing and sneezing. The virus can live for up to two hours where an infected person coughed or sneezed. Infected individuals can spread the measles for several days before and after the rash appears. CDC data shows that if one person has the measles, 90 percent of the people close to that indi-

vidual who are not immune will also become infected.

The best protection against measles is the measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) vaccine. The MMR vaccine provides long-lasting protection against all strains of the virus. While there has been a large amount of debate about vaccination, the MMR vaccine is safe and highly effective.

Children should receive two doses of MMR vaccine for the best protection; the first dose of the vaccine should be administered at 12 through 15 months of age, while the second dose is given from 4 through 6 years of age. Families planning to travel overseas will need to vaccinate their children differently. Babies 6 through 11 months old receive one dose of MMR vaccine before leaving; chil-

dren 12 months of age or older need two doses of MMR vaccine (separated by at least 28 days) before departure.

Older individuals that have previously been vaccinated for the measles and have come in contact with the virus should reach out to their primary physician immediately to determine whether or not their immunization is still effective. If it is not, appropriate steps include another dose of MMR vaccine or prescribing a medicine called immune globulin, which contains antibodies to help the body protect itself from being infected by various diseases.

GOINGGREEN Avoiding The Pitfalls Of Misusing Your Garbage Disposal

With the holidays over, the serious clean up begins, particularly in the kitchen. Some people may be tempted to throw food waste and all of the spoiled leftovers down the garbage disposal. Not so fast! Not everything should be put down the sink.

The modern garbage disposal has been a tremendous convenience for homeowners worldwide. It provides a quick and sanitary way to dispose of food waste. Because of their simplicity and solid construction, disposals are workhorses, potentially grinding away year after year. But even this venerable appliance can choke on certain items. Here are some things to never put in your disposal in any quantity if you want to keep it running smooth and keep your drains clog-free.

Bones will just keep spinning around with the blades. If you're lucky enough to get them down, they definitely won't make it past the drain pipes. Garbage disposals simply aren't made to deal with extremely hard items such as bones. If you do drop a chicken wing or fish bone in the disposal, don't panic. Disposals are hardy appliances, and can handle grinding up the occasional small bone. But if you try to drop a rack of ribs down your sink and grind them up, you're setting yourself up for disaster.

Have you ever tried to cut through something as hard as stone peach pits or accidentally bitten down on a cherry or olive pit? Those are just as bad as bones and don't belong in the disposal.

Celery's fibrous strings tend to tangle around disposal blades. This also applies to asparagus and corn husks.

Coffee grounds are deceptive. They appear to go down easy, but really they're going to accumulate and cause a sludgy, sediment-like mess in your drain. Put those old grounds into a empty coffee can. When the can is full, sprinkle them around the base of acid loving plants, such as azaleas and rhododendrons.

Pasta, oatmeal, and rice all expand when exposed to water, even after being fully cooked. Whether you have a garbage disposal or not, don't dump them down the drain, where they will swell and either fill the disposal trap or cause even bigger problems.

Grease and oil might not even make it into the disposal and will likely clog up your pipes instead, creating a worse mess as it begins to go rancid. That's just not

There's some controversy when it comes to egg shells. Some say they're safe for the disposal and can help to sharpen the disposal's blades; others believe the shells' membrane lining can stick to the sides of the disposal and wrap around the shredder, wreaking lots of havoc. To be on the safe side, put egg shells in a paper bag in the garage until spring. Then mash them and put them in the vegetable beds for added calcium.

Even if you run your garbage disposer until the last shred of food is gone, and you let the water run the recommended time, you can still wind up with an out-ofcontrol science experiment that stinks up your kitchen. Face it, some food is going to stick to the inside of the grinding chamber, and it's going to decay. Cleaning the garbage disposal with ice and lemon rinds

is one option. Another good maintenance practice is to put a squirt of grease-cutting dish washing cleaner like Dawn onto an

old toothbrush. Scrub under the splash guard of the garbage disposal until it's clean, and rinse thoroughly.

Once the kitchen is clean, break out the left over Christmas cookies and toast the New Year!

Keeping Dogs Safe In Cold, Winter Weather

You probably know the risks of warm weather and leaving pets in cars, but cold weather also poses serious threats to your pet's health.

Just because the weather is colder doesn't mean your dog won't be looking forward to their daily walks or outside activities. It does mean that you will have to make adjustments to how long you are outside; you'll also need to keep a closer eye on your dog to make sure they are handling the cold okay.

Some dogs, like huskies, malamutes, and St. Bernards, can tolerate the cold weather better than others. Smaller dogs with thin coats, very young dogs or older dogs are more susceptible to colder temperatures, especially when it's 45 degrees or lower. At extremely low temperatures, dogs can experience hypothermia and frostbite.

Medium and large breeds can walk for 30 minutes if the temperature is 25 degrees and above. Small dogs can walk 15 minutes in that extreme temperature. When the temperature gets colder, I recommend that you take your dog for shorter walks to go the bathroom and then back home. The same goes for going out in the yard. If there is snow or ice on the ground, shovel a path to a specific area so the dog has a place to go potty then come right back in the house.

Small dogs' bellies and chests are closer to the ground and will get cold much faster than larger, taller dogs. You may have seen little dogs with snow balls stuck to their chest and bellies when they come in from the outside. This is very dangerous and could cause hypothermia. In mild cases, dogs will shiver. As it progresses, they could show signs of lethargy and weakness. Hypothermia will continue to worsen if the dog is not taken inside to warm up. Severe cases can be life threatening.

When the dog's body gets cold, their body will pull blood from the extremities to the center of the body to help them stay warm. Ears, paws and tail can get so cold that ice crystals can form and damage the skin. Frostbite can be difficult to detect and may not be visible for a few days. Watch for signs of gray or pale skin. It could also make the skin turn hard. As the skin warms, it can be extremely

painful.

Smaller dogs with short fur can really benefit from wearing a coat or sweater outside in the cold winter months. Have several of them, so a dry one is always available. A wet or damp coat can chill a dog even faster. You should still be cautious of the temperatures with your dog even though they are wearing a coat. Sweaters and coats won't prevent frost-bite on their ears, feet or tail.

If you take your dog for a walk in the snow, be sure to clean your dog's paws thoroughly when you return home. Neighbors may throw rock salt or ice melt on their sidewalks. Some of these products are not safe for dogs. Little pieces can get stuck between their paws and can cause severe burns to their skin. It can also be toxic if they lick their feet and ingest these products. If you see dry, cracked paw pads, you can use coconut oil to soften them.

Dogs that normally live outside during spring, summer, and fall cannot and should not spend the winter months outside. New Jersey now has an extreme weather law; dogs are not permitted to be left outside in extreme temperatures

of 35 degrees or lower. If you notice a neighbor's dog outside in these cold temperatures, don't hesitate to contact the police or animal control to check on the welfare of the dog. You could save

the dog's life.

The best policy for dogs in the cold weather is to use common sense. If it is too cold for you to be outside, it is too cold for your dog.

Public Works suspended curbside leaf collection on Dec. 31 and began switching the trucks over to prepare for snow. Although our staff will use fair weather days to clean leaves out of the parks and playgrounds, we will require all leaves to be bagged and placed at the curb for Wednesday's yard debris pickup. There is no limit to the amount of yard debris you may place out.

As for snow, plowing operations typi-

cally don't begin until there are 4 inches Live Christmas Tree Disposal of accumulation. Public Works has the two-story rock salt storage building filled to the brim and ready for whatever conditions winter throws our way. It is our mission to plow from curb to curb and provide the widest area for emergency vehicles to maneuver. We encourage residents to not dig out their driveway aprons until we've been down your street. This is an unfortunate byproduct of plowing and we request your patience as our crews typically endure countless overnight hours to clear our town. Here's hoping for a mild winter!

Pulling the January 2018 call log – and one instance in February - I noticed we received a handful of calls about how to dispose of live Christmas trees. I'd imagine the one that held onto their tree until February is more committed to the holiday than I am!

You can place your live Christmas tree at the curb on Tuesday afternoons for collection during the normal Wednesday vard debris pickup. It does not have to be in a bag, nor cut up, although the bag may make it cleaner to remove from your

If you have a live tree that is flocked or has lights/tinsel remaining on the tree, you will have to place it out with your regular trash, due to the non-vegetative material.

Dealing With Pot Holes

A winter article wouldn't be complete without the mentioning of pot holes. Public Works has a designated crew that responds to all reports of pot holes located on Pennsauken roads. Remember. not all roads within Pennsauken's borders are owned by the Township and maintained by Public Works. Pot holes tend to pop up when the weather begins to get warm and then cold again. That being said, if you come across one over the deep freeze months, we can temporarily fill them until conditions are improved enough for a proper cut-out and

patch can be made.

sense of comfort after discussing our typical issues and the uncertainty that comes with change.

South Jersey Sanitation is not new to our area. They have serviced nearby Camden County towns, such as Barrington, Haddon Heights, Collingswood, Haddon Township, as well as several towns in Burlington County. We will be providing new contact information for complaints that you can call directly to South Jersey Sanitation; or you can continue to call the Public Works office and we will forward your issues along to them for correction.

The Township anticipates that there will be a couple weeks of adjustment for the new company to familiarize their

crews with Pennsauken. That being said, you may be missed, or notice that your trash was collected at a different time during the day. Since the new trash crews only get one day a week to learn on any given street, it's not unreasonable to expect 3-4 weeks of stumbling before all of the kinks are worked out. We will work through it together and thank you for

your patience in advance.

In 2019, you will also notice that Pennsauken, in conjunction with other towns throughout Camden County, will be refining our recycling efforts. Due to China's refusal of contaminated recyclables from the United States, these requirements are trickling down to individual towns; as a result, we need to recycle better. South Jersev Sanitation's arrival to Pennsauken has no impact on our efforts to clean up our recycling. They are paid to collect and drop off trash, recycling, yard debris or white goods (metal) at the appropriate facilities. For some additional information on the adjustments in recycling, see page 23 of this issue of All Around Pennsauken. It's worth mentioning again: NOTH-ING is changing with your trash and recycling collection, except for the crew that does the work and the name on the side of the truck. We will experience the same six trash holidays during the year: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, and Christmas. Each of these days will push the schedule back one day, just like it has always worked. If you have any questions at all, simply call the Public Works office at (856)-663-0178.


