According to the National Fire Protection Association, you're three times as likely to have a home fire in the kitchen on Thanksgiving than any other day of the year!

Here are some helpful tips to make sure that both your food – and your property – don't get burnt this holiday.

- Keep an eye on cooking food unattended cooking is a contributing factor to 34 percent of all home fires; also be sure to keep things that can catch fire away from the cooking area
- Watch the range ranges or cook tops account for almost three out of five reported home fires; ovens account for 16 percent
- Don't fry that turkey turkey fryers pose a significant danger, causing serious burns and fires; if you really want that fried turkey, leave it to the profes-

sionals

 If there is a fire, don't try to fight it yourself – more than half of reported non-fatal home cooking fire injuries occurred when victims tried to fight the fire themselves; call 9-1-1 immediately

By keeping these important tips in mind, you can keep your loved ones and home safe not just during the holidays, but all year round.

## Pennsauken's Riverfront Village Receives Housing Revitalization Award

The Riverfront Village at Pennsauken was one of four real estate development projects honored with Governor's Excellence in Housing and Economic Development Awards at the 2017 Annual Governor's Conference on Housing and Economic Development.

"Development of housing for individuals with special needs has been a priority for the Administration," said Charles A. Richman, Commissioner of the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs (DCA). "There are many sites across the state that offer creative developers a blank canvas to address this issue." DCA is one of the hosts of the Governor's Conference.

The Riverfront Village at Pennsauken received the Housing Revitalization Award, as a project that demonstrated the revitalization or redevelopment of distressed or blighted neighborhoods while including an affordable or work-

force housing component.

"Riverfront Village is incredibly beautiful with wonderful attention to detail," says Pennsauken Mayor Betsy McBride, who accepted the award. "It is an opportunity for those who live in workforce housing to have a great view of the Delaware River and Philadelphia, while having amazing access to public transportation via the Pennsauken Transit Center."

The Riverfront Village at Pennsauken involves the transformation of the formerly vacant Acme site on River Rd., abandoned for nearly 25 years, into an affordable family housing development. The project includes 75 affordable family units in eight buildings, with five set aside for homeless veterans. Riverfront Village is immediately adjacent to a stop on the light rail River Line linking Camden to Trenton, as well as a bus station with connections to other transit links, giving working residents easy access to regional

employment centers. The development is part of Pennsauken's Waterfront Master Plan, which outlines the municipality's vision for the area's redevelopment. The project partners are Conifer Realty, LLC, Kitchen & Associates, Pennsauken Township, Camden County Improvement Authority and Camden County Housing Association.

"These awards celebrate some of the best examples of quality affordable housing, supportive housing and public-private partnerships that have been placed in service throughout New Jersey over the last two and a half years," said New Jersey Housing and Mortgage Finance Agency Executive Director Anthony L. Marchetta. "These projects embody the respective missions of our agencies to provide quality affordable housing opportunities, create and retain jobs, and improve the quality of life for all New Jerseyans."





## Learning Engineering Skills At Roosevelt



Third and fourth graders at Roosevelt are learning important engineering skills through unique projects, like designing bubble mixtures and creating objects with neutral buoyancy that will float in the middle of the bubbles.

Science lab students in third and fourth grade at Roosevelt Elementary School have been improving their engineering skills through the design process.

Given specific criteria and constraints, the third graders have created objects with neutral buoyancy that don't float or sink but hang somewhere in the middle; they've also constructed tools to build cup towers without touching the cups.

Fourth graders have experimented to find the best bubble mixture and de-

signed small cars that run on wind power.

Research shows that by instilling a curiosity for science and engineering at an early age, that interest stays with students into high school, increasing the likelihood that these talented young people will consider a career in the sciences in the future. In addition, the analytical and problem-solving skills they learn today will help them in other subjects in their academic careers.

Each month, boards of education throughout the state of New Jersey hold public meetings. Public meetings are a crucial part of our constitutional republic. They provide an opportunity for citizens to share their views on a variety of topics. In the case of board of education meetings, the business conducted is related to school matters. Given that approximately 30 percent of school

funding for Pennsauken School District comes from municipal taxes, which are collected from residents, it is important for each and every community member to have an avenue to voice their opinions regarding their schools.

Though the Pennsauken Board of Education values the input of residents, it is important to understand the monthly board meetings have a specific purpose and structure. Our meetings are held with the explicit purpose of conducting business related to the School District. In order to accomplish our task. like other governing bodies, the Pennsauken Board of Education follows the guidelines set by "Robert's Rules of Order," which is the most commonlyused guide for parliamentary procedures in the United States. This manual delineates how meetings should be run including the making of motions, rules for voting on and debating business items listed on the agenda and the guidelines for public participation and comment.

In accordance with Robert's Rules, it is during the public portion of the monthly business meeting that the Pennsauken Board of Education gives citizens the opportunity to share their views and comments on school-related matters. During each public meeting, there are two opportunities for the public to comment. One of these opportunities is at the beginning of the meeting. This public comment session is restricted to agenda items only. This means that "anyone with an interest in the functions or duties of the board" is permitted to share their comments but the comments must be regarding a matter that is listed on the agenda. At the end of the meeting, there is a second opportunity for public comment. This public comment session is not

restricted to items on the agenda. In other words, members of the public can discuss any topic related to the schools.

Public comment sessions are an important part of any board meeting. They give every citizen the opportunity to address concerns or give comments pertaining to the Pennsauken School District. The Board of Education strongly believes in the right to public comment. However, it should be understood that public comment is not a question and answer session with the Board of Education, superintendent, business administrator, any other school district official or our board attorney. It is simply an opportunity for residents to express their views. The Board of Education is not involved in the daily operations of the school district. Therefore, questions concerning the school district's daily operations should always be directed to school officials during regular business hours in order to receive prompt and appropriate answers.

The Pennsauken of Education "always welcomes and solicits input from the public," as we clearly state on each agenda. It is crucial to the success of the School District to have the input of the stakeholders from the community. The Pennsauken Board of Education meets every third Tuesday of the month. We welcome all citizens to join us for a meeting!

### **Board Bit Of The Month**

"Robert's Rules of Order" was first published in 1876 by Henry Martyn Robert, a US Army major, to provide guidance to newly established non-legislative bodies. The Pennsauken Board of Education has been using Robert's Rules since it was formed over 50 years ago.

sump pit to the sanitary sewage collection system is prohibited.

Cooking grease poured down the drain can cause a blockage of the lateral line. Please dispose of grease properly.



## MPWC WATERLINES

## **New Jersey Water Quality Accountability**

The American Society of Civil Engineers has graded American infrastructure with a grade of a D. While the MPWC has been very proactive about upgrading and replacing our infrastructure, not all of the utilities in New Jersey or the rest of the United States have taken infrastructure replacement so seriously.

Recent news articles involving both public and private water utilities' failure to maintain their systems or adequately treat their water supply have prompted New Jersey to pass laws meant to force purveyors to invest in and maintain their water systems. The legislation is called the Water Quality Accountability Act (WQAA); it was unanimously passed by the New Jersey House of Representatives and Senate in July of 2017.

There are four main physical elements of the plan. The first area covered is valves and valve maintenance. Each water system has valves to control water flow and isolate mains in the event of an issue. The WQAA requires that all valves 12" and over be exercised every two years and all other valves be exercised at least every four years. Exercising valves, which is the process of opening and closing the valves to make sure they are okay and performing maintenance when required, makes sure

the valves are not seized and are operable when needed. MPWC has a valve exercising system in place where we evaluate and exercise all valves. In order to comply with the new law, MPWC will exercise between 500 and 800 valves per year.

All valves also need to be located using GPS software and entered into a geographic information system (GIS). The MPWC has just completed our GIS, which shows the location of every curb stop, valve, hydrant, and main. We are in the process of bringing this system live so our personnel can use the GIS in the field.


The second area covered is infrastructure investment. All utilities must prepare an asset management plan for their wells, tanks, treatment facilities, water mains, and valves. The MPWC has already prepared plans for our system. The WQAA requires that water mains are replaced at a rate of almost one percent per year. As you have probably seen around our service area, the MPWC has identified mains that have reached the end of their useful lives and replaced them as necessary. As time goes on and the system ages, we will naturally replace more of our 220 miles of pipe to continue to comply and best serve our customers.

Fire hydrants are also covered under the WQAA. All hydrants must be marked, inspected and tested annually. A flushing plan must be developed for the system. The MPWC already has a flushing plan in place. Flushing removes sediment from water mains and is a necessary practice to maintain water quality. The MPWC's plan has been modified to include every hydrant, every year. We are currently in the process of creating hydrant markers for each of our hydrants.

The last component of the Act is cyber risk management. A plan must be in place to protect the controls of each of our water plants. Firewalls and system controls are in place to protect our computer systems. As computers are an ever-

changing landscape, we will continue to upgrade our security requirements using intrusion detection and vulnerability testing.

The MPWC has actively maintained our system and already does many of the Act requirements Because of our proactive approach, we are positioned better than most utilities to meet the requirements outlined above. As with any new legislation, there will be necessary changes we will need to make in order to comply. The MPWC has always strived to bring you the best quality water at the best possible price. We will continue to do just that as we move forward under this new legislation.

If you have a remote device on the exterior of your property that allows us to read your water meter, we need to verify that it is working properly and recording your water usage accurately. Recent issues with the remotes have caused inaccurate readings and higher customer bills.

### On The Web

Pennsauken Township's web site, twp.pennsauken.nj.us, has several links that can help point residents in the right direction. At the top of the menu on the left hand side of every page on the Township's web site, there's a "What Department Do I Need?" button. From issues about abandoned/vacant properties to zoning questions, you can find the appropriate phone number to get the an-

swers you need by clicking that link.

At the bottom of that same menu, there's a "Keep Me Informed" button. Clicking that link will take you to an online form to sign up for Pennsauken Township's eNewsletter. Residents will be emailed information about community events, holiday schedule changes, and more.

By clicking on the "Contact Us" button, you'll find an online form residents can use to reach out to the Clerk's Office, send an issue about Township roads, contact the Police Department, etc. You'll also find a link containing specific extensions for Township staff.

The Pennsauken Police also have an anonymous tip form on the web site. Visit www.twp.pennsauken.nj.us/police/ anonymous-tip-form and submit your crime tip without giving any personal information. Your message will be sent directly to detectives in the Pennsauken Police Department.

The Pennsauken School District's site, http://www.pennsauken.net, posts a va-

riety of announcements and news items on its main page. The site provides a variety of information, including employment opportunities, parent resources, a list of key district personnel, and more. You can also access the District calendar, which highlights a variety of events.

### **Social Media**

Pennsauken Township has a Facebook page that posts information several times throughout the week and responds to questions from residents. Be sure to visit www.facebook.com/ PennsaukenTwp/ and "Like" the page so that updates show up on your newsfeed. The Pennsauken Township Police Department, The Merchantville-Pennsauken Water Commission, and the Pennsauken School District, also have very active Facebook pages; each posts information on a regular basis.

The Township's Twitter account, @PennsaukenTwp, generally posts information several times each month. The Fire Department, @PennsaukenFire, actively tweets as well.

### Reverse 9-1-1

The Merchantville-Pennsauken Water Commission employs a reverse 9-1-1 notification system, which informs customers about water main breaks, hydrant flushing, etc. The Township also uses the system to provide updates on changes to trash and recycling pick up, snow closures, and more. If you haven't signed up already, visit www.mpwc.com/ notify-me/ and complete the form on the page.

So be sure to take advantage of these online resources to get notifications from the Township and stay informed. And for the record, Veterans Day is not a trash holiday; this year's Holiday Parade will be held on Saturday, Nov. 25 at 1:00 p.m.; and the town's animal control officer can be contacted by calling (856) 663-3058.

## **PUBLICWORKS** A New Recycling Initiative, Benefiting The Environment And Pennsauken

The Camden County Division of Environmental Affairs has embarked on a new initiative to expand the recycling efforts of all towns in Camden County. Pennsauken Township has already begun outreach initiatives to businesses and is looking to expand to religious institutions, schools, and our residents.

Each year, an annual "recycling tonnage report" is compiled by Anthony Feriozzi, the Township's recycling coordinator and the Public Works Department superintendent. Waste Man-

agement, the town's Trash collection contractor, provides the tonnage for all of the recyclables picked up from all over town each week from Pennsauken's various neighborhoods. This also includes any "white goods," metal products such as appliances, filing cabinets and scrap metal, as well as yard debris picked up on Wednesdays.

A fair amount of businesses, such as those in our expansive industrial parks. have private recycling collection performed by various contractors and report these figures in to the Public Works office for the annual report.

The first phase of this new initiative is to identify those businesses that do not report these figures annually. There is no cost involved, just a simple e-mail or phone call, passing along the end-of-year tonnage for a particular business or group of businesses with shared recycling collection.

Why the new initiative? Expanding the recycling efforts in Pennsauken will undoubtedly have a positive impact on the environment. I've noticed that my recvclables outweigh my trash on occasion from junk mail and my wife's drinking habits... this is just a joke; writing an interesting article about recycling is not easy! We'll see if she still reads this column...

The bottom line: yep, that's right, it comes down to money. Each year, as a result of the Township's recycling tonnage report, Pennsauken receives a recycling grant dollar amount. These funds are used to purchase recycling buckets for new residents, support those that are expanding their recycling efforts, and even for new recycling initiatives around town.

It's a win-win. An increased amount of businesses reporting each year will increase Pennsauken's annual tonnage amount and will subsequently increase the following year's grant amount. That means we can double-down on more efforts via recycling education, expansion of existing programs and get that grant amount even higher! Remember, this grant offsets the need to have our Municipal taxes cover these initiatives.

As a related aside, Pennsauken residents are all too familiar with the bright yellow recycling buckets that the Township hands out. If yours is broken, stop by our complex at 6725 Wayne Ave.; the main gate is on Clement Ave. across from Wawa. Rachael will be glad to assist you. Please bring your damaged one so that we can...you guessed it...recycle it!

I thank all of you for hanging along for this article, as I know it is a bit dry. Keep a look out for the start of the leaf collection season, formally beginning after Nov. 7. We will be posting our weekend routes on both the Township and All Around Pennsauken's Facebook accounts.



## Freeholder Board Receives \$400,000 Grant To Combat Opioid Abuse

In 2016, nearly 60,000 Americans lost their lives due to a drug overdose. Most of these deaths were the result of opioid abuse, a crisis affecting communities across the United States. Last month, Camden County received a federal grant from the U.S. Department of Justice to implement a new re-entry program improving treatment support services for inmates with a history of opioid abuse.

The \$400,000 grant will be used to implement the Camden County Opioid Abuse Diversion Program (CCOAD). Freeholder Jonathan Young, liaison to the Department of Public Safety, highlighted the critical need for relief and aid to those struggling with opioid abuse in the county's corrections system.

"The opioid epidemic is a public health crisis in our community and across the country," Young said. "This funding allows us to explore new ways to help those who are already struggling by providing services that will cut down on recidivism and save taxpayers money. We know many inmates come into our facility fighting against a dependency to opioids and now

we can start taking a closer look on reentry and getting them the tools they need to be successful upon release."

According to a 2016 Release Outcome Report of the New Jersey Department of Corrections (NJDOC), more than 10,000 inmates are let out of New Jersey's jails and prisons on an annual basis. It costs more than \$50,000 a year to house an inmate for a year, and New Jersey has a recidivism rate near 31 percent in the first three years of release. Addiction and substance abuse are one of the main drivers of this revolving door in the criminal justice system.

The CCOAD will begin with a comprehensive assessment of the opioid crisis in Camden County. After the completion of the assessment, services will target individuals with a history of abuse and who have come into contact with the criminal justice system. The program will include an ongoing effort to evaluate and analyze the effectiveness of its initiatives. The Walter Rand Institute of Public Affairs at Rutgers University will serve as the project's research partner.

The Department of Justice awarded a total of \$1.1 million to three New Jersey-based opioid abuse programs, including Camden County's. The Department of Justice is awarding a total of \$58.9 million nationwide to address the epidemic as part of the Comprehensive Addiction and Recovery Act (CARA). The act is the first major piece of federal substance use disorder treatment and recovery legislation in over 40 years.

"The Freeholder Board is committed to leading the charge against opioid use and drug addiction and creating a model reentry system," Young explained. "We are working to get help to as many people as possible, and we're striving to make getting that help easier than ever before."

## **GOINGGREEN** Cleaning Furniture To Prepare For The Holidays

As we age, aches and pains begin to affect our ability to do everything we once did. As an avid gardener, it's very frustrating to me that I can't dig large holes, haul heavy pots, and spread manure and mulch at the rate I did 30 years ago. Pain affected my ability to prepare my column last month, as I tend to overdo it more times than I should. However, I am back at the keyboard today. While my doctor tries alternative strategies for getting me back on my feet, my attention turns to preparing for the holidays.

A few months ago, I acquired a vintage solid cherry wood dining room set for my guy for Christmas. And yes, he was there to make sure he liked it before I bought it. Furniture manufacturers moved facilities overseas and cheapened the quality of new furniture beginning in the 1990s. I prefer solid wood furniture made in the 1980s or earlier. The newly acquired dining room suite was structurally sound, but cosmetically less than perfect. Why won't children and guests use coasters? Here's my journey of furniture restoration in time for the holidays

First, I removed everything on the fur-

niture, including the chair pads, which are usually screwed onto the wood frame from underneath. I then cleaned all the wood with a good oil- based soap (e.g. Murphy's Oil Soap) mixed with warm water to remove any accumulated dust and dirt. The table and backs of the chairs were sticky from years of spills. It took several batches of warm soapy water to get down to the original finish. The former owner used the dining room chairs as a step stool while re-painting the dining room, so there were also paint spatters to address. Using cotton balls soaked

with rubbing alcohol, I gently rubbed the paint spatters off and washed the furniture down again with soap to remove the alcohol residue. Next, I had to deal with the scuffs, scratches, and water stains. There are a few methods to try, and I wound up using them all. Regardless of the mixture you try, always use a 100 percent white cotton rag, old t-shirts or socks work well. Rub in the direction of the wood grain, never against. In between each cleaning mixture, wash the wood with oil soap to remove cleaning residue.

You can also mix fresh lemon juice

OR white vinegar with boiled linseed oil. Gently rub every surface, concentrating on the scratches and water stains. Deeper scratches may require rubbing with mineral spirits. In this case, use 0000 super fine steel wool to gently rub water stains or scratches. Gouges where the wood is exposed below the finish will require a matching color stain or scratch pen. Be careful here, the objective is to hide scratches, not recolor the entire piece of furniture. Also, I prefer not to sand and refinish the furniture, thus preserving the original finish, and saving lots of time.

Once the scratches and stains were hidden as well as possible, I covered the furniture with a thin coat of linseed oil. You have to let this sit for a day or so, then rub clean with another cotton cloth. If the wood is really dry, additional coats may be necessary. The final step is to use a paste wax with natural ingredients such as bee's wax, not silicone (I learned this from a former employee of Thomasville furniture). It took hours of hard rubbing, but the wood grain is again visible and glowing.

If a buffet or side table with brass handles needs to be cleaned, I use a brass polish and another piece of soft cotton cloth to return the bright finish to the handles.

The dining room suite is now gleaming, almost like new. Almost ready for holiday guests. Next month, I'll talk about recovering those old chair seats with updated material and soft padding.

## Sixteen Months, Five Hundred And Four Properties, Zero Cost To The Township

Over two years ago, the Pennsauken Township Committee recognized the growing issue of blight throughout the town. Although this issue was not isolated to Pennsauken, the Committee understood that if not addressed quickly and aggressively, the problem would get out of control. Something needed to be done; the solution also had to be self-reliant, as to not cost the residents a financial hardship. From there came the Vacant Property Program, a program built on the foundation of accountability. The Committee is accountable for looking at the big picture and moving quickly to set up the program; the banks are accountable for maintaining the properties; and the program itself is accountable for managing through the process of getting the properties occupied.

The Committee realized that there was not going to be a quick fix, but that the Township needed a program that would give us sustainable long term results. It was quickly realized that before we could move forward, we had to understand what needed to be done to ensure we were well armed and prepared at all levels to take this huge issue to task.

It started with studying and researching all of our legal options, making what-

ever changes were necessary to current ordinances in order to achieve our goal. With that we put in place a whole new set of vacant, foreclosed and abandoned property ordinances, all with the intent of holding the banks accountable for their responsibilities and the Township's goal to get these properties occupied.

This program is now the desired model for all of the townships and cities in Camden County. Our results have proven that all the work done to ensure the program's success was well worth the time and effort.

Sixteen months later, here where we are: to date, 504 of our 621 vacant properties have been sold. The Township identified 22 of the worst properties in town and has only six remaining. Sixteen properties were addressed through either rehabilitation or demolition at no cost to the Township or its taxpayers.

This year alone through August 2017, Pennsauken Township has collected \$378,000 in registration fees. Although this number does not completely replace the lost tax revenue from these properties, it does help to cover some of the cost which in the end goes back to the residents in the form of services and programs.

Through this program, the Township has identified 211 additional property maintenance companies. The value of

that is priceless. It's not only realized in an 80 percent reduction of public works resources related to vacant properties, but just in the general maintenance of these properties across the whole town.

The Township positioned a vacant property inspector in April; since then, he has written over 1,900 individual violations, again holding the banks accountable. We've been able to move the measure of accountability forward, putting over 25 properties into the penalty phase of our ordinance. Pennsauken has created a sense of urgency for the banks to address the maintenance issues quicker. If they don't, they'll pay the very steep penalties that come with neglect.

We've changed the town's housing resale inspection process to expedite the turnover of these properties, while continuing to keep the safety, health, and welfare of our residents top of mind. This has been a huge help to bringing more investors and contractors into town. Because of this change, Pennsauken has increased the revenue to the Building Department through the need for additional permits and inspections on the properties that are sold.

Our fire and police departments have also joined the program. Our fire inspectors have added an additional layer of staff to assist in getting more inspections

completed; and our police help keep a close eye on the activity and access to these properties.

We know that even with all these accomplishments, there is still a lot of work to be done here in Pennsauken. We believe in our program, but we know we need to continue to challenge ourselves to evolve and grow as this issue calls for. We are committed to continuing to look in the mirror and challenge ourselves on how we can do better both internally and externally and how we can adjust and change as we work our way through

to the elimination of this problem.

## Al Fisher Inducted Into Kent State Athletics Hall Of Fame

Notable homegrown basketball talent and current coach at Pennsauken High School, Al Fisher was inducted into Kent State's Varsity "K" Athletics Hall of Fame on September 30, 2017.

Fisher earned MAC Player of the Year honors after leading the Flashes to conference regular season and tournament titles in 2008. A two-time first team all-conference selection, he also earned an honorable mention spot on the AP's All-America Team. In just two seasons, Fisher surpassed 1,000 career points and dished out 261 assists.

During his time playing basketball at Pennsauken High School, Fisher averaged 22 points, graduating as the leading scorer in PHS history, a record he still holds to this date. He led the Indians to a 23-5 record and the Central Jersey Group 4 title in 2004. Fisher returned to his alma mater to coach the boys basketball team in 2016.
