# Pennsauken School District To Hold Bond Referendum

The Pennsauken School District is asking residents to consider a bond referendum that will make significant improvements to every public school throughout the Township. The vote, to be held on Tuesday, March 13,2018, will allocate almost \$36 million for various initiatives, while actually reducing school taxes for Pennsauken households.

"The goal of the referendum is to simply increase the education opportunities offered both academically and vocation-

ally to the students throughout Pennsauken Public Schools," says Dr. Ronnie Tarchichi, superintendent, Pennsauken School District. "In addition, we want to increase the availability of athletic programs offered to our students; we also want to be competitive amongst all schools in South Jersey."

The proposed referendum addresses a variety of projects in every part of the District, including new security vestibules at all schools; capital improvement to elementary schools with new windows and doors; the establishment of all-day preschool; the demolition of an aging Longfellow Elementary and the erection of a comprehensive community park and playground in the school's old footprint; the addition of three new science labs and two additional classrooms at Phifer Middle School; the transformation of Roosevelt Elementary into a high-tech magnet high school, with the addition of a brand new

It must have been 1959 or 1960. The Christmas holidays were rapidly approaching. School was already closed. The tree was in a bucket out back, the lights were up on the front porch and boxes of decorations were down from the attic.

In a manner not uncommon to small boys, I was eagerly awaiting Christmas Day, and totally unprepared. With 24 hours until that magical day, I had exactly one gift hidden away, and no prospects of buying any more.

I awoke early that Christmas Eve, to find a winter wonderland. Parents and shopkeepers everywhere must have been in a panic. I was saved!

I took out the family snow shovel, a heavy push type, and raced to my nearest neighbor. Bundled up and heavily protected in my woolen coat and snap-front galoshes, I worked feverishly. Receiving my first pay of the day, I trudged the four blocks up Westfield to Marazzo's 5&10, a long standing Westfield Ave. landmark, now the location of Cricket Wireless. Domino's Pizza, Levelz Barbershop, Metro PCS and Wild Wings, I bought a lovely light aluminum snow shovel, and I was the first customer of the day. Joe Marazzo, perhaps sensing my plight, gave me the shovel at a discount. Then he paid me handsomely for cleaning his own sidewalk outside the store.

I worked like a man possessed. I shoveled houses, stores, cars stuck on the street. I used that new shovel like a machine. The Cozy Corner Luncheonette, located at the corners of Westfield and Lexington, served a hot dog, a Coke, and chips for 29 cents, the perfect lunch for a weary snow shoveler. By three in the afternoon, I was rich.

Swaggering back on "The Avenue," which is the term we always used for Westfield, I paused at Thor's Rexall

Drug Store, where Troy's Deli currently resides. They had it all. Evening in Paris in that magnificent, gaudy bottle for Grandmom, El Productos for Pop Lee, a new Big Ben alarm clock for Mom, and a wide assortment of baubles and bangles for my kid sisters rounded out my holiday spending spree.

I added a few Christmas cards to my bag of goodies, and headed home, satisfied with a day's work well done.

As I rounded the corner heading to the house, all smug and weighted down with my bags of presents. I caught sight of my dad. Home early from work for Christmas, Dad was out front shoveling our steps. And the final piece of my Christmas shopping puzzle fell into place. I snuck into the house from the back, scooted down to the basement and cleaned off that shiny new snow shovel. With a big red bow and ribbon, it was the perfect gift for Dad. It was a lot lighter than that old monster we had, and would be easier on his back after a hard day at work. Or maybe on mine, should I ever remember to do our own steps before rushing out to make a buck.

Christmas morning dawned, as it

always did to us children back then, bright, sparkling with lights and the smell of pine.

The presents were devoured, wrapping paper was everywhere; Mom and Dad were sitting on the floor, looking up at our Nativity scene. I remember thinking that the real miracle of Christmas might just be bailing out a youngster at the last possible minute, and teaching a lesson at the same time.

Statistics indicate that a majority of individuals suffering from blood cancer – 70 percent - do not have a blood or bone marrow match with a family member and therefore require a non-family member to donate. And according to the National Bone Marrow Program, there are 14,000 patients per year whose only hope for a cure is a transplant from someone outside their family.

"We encourage our residents to take the time to be considered as a donor," says Township Committeeman Rick Taylor. "The process is simple; and while

there's no obligation to be a donor, doing so can be life saving."

Anyone between the ages of 18 to 44 can join the registry. If an individual is called as a potential match for a patient in need, making a commitment as a donor means that this person is willing to take up to 20-30 hours, spread over four to six weeks, to attend an information session, attend appointments, and make a bone marrow donation.

If an individual matches a patient in need, there are two ways to donate. The patient's doctor chooses the donation method that is best for the patient. Peripheral blood stem cell (PBSC) donation is a non-surgical, outpatient procedure called

apheresis. The donor receives a drug for five days prior to donation that increases the number of cells in the bloodstream. The cells are then collected during donation. The donor may experience head or muscle aches that disappear shortly after donation, and are typically back to their normal routine in one to two days. Marrow donation is a surgical, outpatient procedure that takes place in a hospital operating room. While the donor is under anesthesia, doctors collect marrow

from the back of their pelvic bone. After donation, donors may feel soreness in the lower back. Donors are typically back to their normal routine in two to seven days.

# Winter Wonderland For Pennsauken Unlikely

The signs of winter are here: Christmas décor is popping up, it is really cold outside, and the good folks of Pennsauken are starting to talk about snow. This year, the conversations generally start with, "It's been so warm, winter will be..." Let's see if we can finish that

First, a few disclaimers, I am a science teacher at Pennsauken High School who knows very little about the weather. although that doesn't stop the TV announcers from earning money. I'm just an amateur social media weather enthusiast. In other words, I just have fun with it. I love snow! Apologies to all those wannabe Florida residents who dislike snowmen. There will be some technical "sciency" stuff because I like to teach. However, I wasn't allowed the entire paper, so I'll keep it short here and you can go to AllAroundPennsauken.com for my detailed explanation, with maybe an update.

A winter outlook would not be complete without considering La Niña, northern blocking, polar jet stream, Siberian snow, October/November temperatures, arctic ice, polar vortex, and Atlantic temperatures. As of now, not one of these factors is screaming louder than the others. We're likely looking at a weak La Niña (cool Pacific equals a cold/snowy East Coast); Siberian and arctic ice are about normal or less (so-so winter); northern blocking and the polar vortex may arrive (good news); and a warm fall and warm Atlantic (statistically bad for us). Unless a particular factor ends up having a stronger influence, I believe Pennsauken will mostly be stuck in the middle of a cold and snowy north and a warm and wet south. Fluctuations in either direction will dictate our weather and mixed precipitation

may be the common theme. In general, we will have a fairly boring (normal) winter with equal chance of cold/warm and snow/rain. On average, we get about 22 inches of snow. My hypothesis (guess) is that we will have about that, maybe less. Signs also seem to point toward more small snow events than a few big ones. But again... nothing right now is pointing toward anything but a coin toss. After Dec. 1, we may know more. Keep in mind, meteorological winter is Dec. 1 to March 1, but actual winter is Dec. 22 through March 22.

Here are some predictions: December will be about average in temperature with rain the dominating precipitation. Cold and snow could come at the end. January is looking to be the coldest month overall with the best chances of snow. February will warm up again and March could be about normal with swings in either direction. However, if you believe the Farmer's Almanac, which is about as accurate as a scientist and a psychic flipping coins over coffee at Penn Queen, then we could see snow Jan. 23-30, Feb. 4-7 and 16-19, and March 1-3 and 20-23.

# Snow Removal Program For Seniors

Also, the Camden County Freeholder Board offers assistance to senior citizens and disabled residents who are unable to remove significant amounts of snow accumulation from their properties. The Snow Removal Program is available to help seniors and disabled individuals get out of their homes for necessities such as prescriptions or medical appointments. The program uses Camden County Correctional Facility inmates who are carefully screened, non-violent offenders who are guarded at all times on the job site by corrections officers. The Senior Snow Removal Program is an extension of the facility's Road Crew Program.

The Snow Removal Program will go into effect only after four inches of snow have fallen on the ground in our area.





# **Phifer Students Compete In Lockheed Martin Robotics Competition**

Fourteen Phifer Middle School students were selected to participate in the 12th annual Lockheed Martin robotics tutorial and competition: Nicholas Wolfl, Elissa Gallo, Nichole Ouick, Brianna Nguyen, Ebony Arvelo, Daniel Bennett, Kyla Marshall, Alberto Rodriquez, Angel Bien, Jenny Kim, Angel Hernandez, Chelsea Madera, Alexander Day and Nicholas Bonilla.

Through this unique experience, the students are broken up into 11 teams of four and are learn about problem solving, engineering, computer programming, and applied mathematics though the use of EV3 LEGO robotics kits. During the competition, the representatives from Phifer work with other students from both Maple Shade and Carusi middle schools. This exciting event took place on five consecutive Saturdays in October and November. I had

the pleasure of attending the first two competitions in which the students were given various robotics challenges to

On Oct. 7, the students had to con-

struct a robot that could maneuver through a race course and earn points along the way based on accurate programming. Congrats to Chelsea Madera and Nicholas Wolfl's team, who took first

place with the fastest robot race time! Phifer is also proud of Alexander Day's team for earning second place, and Nicholas Bonilla's team for taking third! Nicholas Wolfl said, "Now that I'm an eighth grader, I don't have robotics class anymore, so I am excited about being able to work with the robots every week at Lockheed! I also can't wait to create my own 3-D design, which the Lockheed Martin engineers said they will 3-D print for me once I create it."

During the next competition on Oct. 14, the students had the goal of creating a robot with a color sensor that could follow a black line against a white background in the fastest time. Students not only had to create a robot program capable of making decisions based on whether or not their robot's color sensor detected black or white, but there were also many other variables they had to take into account. For example, students had to decide if there was a particular way they needed to position their robot in relation to the line to make the code work in both directions. They also had to decide how high to construct their color sensor off the ground. Finally, the students had to solve the problem of positioning their color sensor either vertical or at the exact angle that would allow the robot to reflect light accurately so it could detect the proper color. Elissa Gallo said, "My favorite part of the Lockheed Martin Robotics program is building with the EV3 robot parts and

figuring out how to use the new tools and sensors."

During this challenge, Nicholas Bonilla's team took first place and made it around the black line course with the fastest robot time in both directions! Alexander Day's team took second place; and Nichole Quick, Kyla Marshall and Angel Hernandez's team all took third place! Angel Bien's team was also very close to placing in the top three! He received an honorable mention by Lockheed Martin Senior Engineer Michael Kopacks, Angel Bien said, "My favorite part of the competition is that we get to work with people from different schools. I also like that our team members are all assigned different roles and I'm excited to work with them on each challenge!"

All students who participated from Pennsauken, Maple Shade, and Carusi did an excellent job in week one and week two, whether they placed in the top three or not! Pennsauken student Brianna Nguyen said, "I do not play any team sports, but this was my first experience working on a true team and it was amazing! We worked together nicely and communicated well. I am excited about having a new role on my team each week."

"It is not important if your team won or lost," says Kopacks." What matters is how you work as a team to learn something and solve the problem in the best way you can with the allotted time provided."



# **Keep Homes Safe During Holidays With Safety Tips For Decorating**

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) is issuing safety tips for holiday decorations. Holiday decorations, like candles, lights and Christmas trees, add a joyous and festive mood to the holiday season. But when these decorations are not used properly, they can cause fires, injuries and death.

Each year, hospital emergency rooms treat about 12,500 people for falls, cuts, shocks, and burns due to incidents involving faulty holiday lights, dried-out Christmas trees and other holiday decorations.

To prevent these injuries, CPSC monitors holiday lights and other decorations sold at stores and on the Internet. CPSC works with the Bureau of Customs and Border Protection to identify and detain unsafe holiday light sets posing fire risks from being distributed in the U.S.

Visit AllAroundPennsauken.com Christmas trees are involved in about 300 fires annually, resulting in 10 deaths, 30 injuries and an average of about \$10 million in property damage and loss. In addition, there are more than 13,000 candle-related fires each year, which result in 140 deaths and \$205 million in property loss.

"The flickering light of candles can add beauty and tradition to the holidays," said CPSC Chairman Ann Marie Buerkle. "However, when left unattended or within a child's reach, burning candles can turn your celebration into tragedy. Following a few simple safety tips can help prevent holiday decoration-related fires."

CPSC suggests following these tips to make your holiday a safe one.

#### TREES

- When purchasing an artificial tree, look for the label "Fire Resistant." Although this label does not mean the tree won't catch fire, it does indicate the tree is more resistant to burning.
- When purchasing a live tree, check for freshness. A fresh tree is green, needles are hard to pull from branches and do not break when bent between your fingers. The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin, and when tapped on the ground, the tree should not lose many needles.

 When setting up a tree at home, place it away from fireplaces and radiators. Because heated rooms dry live trees out rapidly, be sure to keep the stand filled with water. Place the tree out of the way of traffic and do not block doorways.

#### LIGHTS

- Indoors or outside, use only lights that have been tested for safety by a recognized testing laboratory, such as UL or ETL. This indicates conformance with safety standards. Use only lights that have plugs containing fuses.
- Check each set of lights, new or old, for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections. Throw out damaged sets. Always replace burned-out bulbs promptly with the same wattage bulbs.
- If using an extension cord, make sure it is rated for the intended use.
- Never use electric lights on a metallic tree. The tree can become charged with electricity from faulty lights, and a person touching a branch could be electrocuted.
- Before using lights outdoors, check labels to be sure they have been certified for outdoor use.
- Stay away from power or feeder lines leading from utility poles into older homes.

- Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, house walls, or other firm supports to protect the lights from wind damage. Use only insulated staples (not nails or tacks) to hold strings in place. Or, run strings of lights through hooks (available at hardware stores).
- Turn off all holiday lights when you go to bed or leave the house. The lights could short out and start a fire.
- Use caution when removing outdoor holiday lights. Never pull or tug on lights

   this could cause stress on the connections that could create a fire hazard.
- Outdoor electric lights and decorations should be plugged into circuits protected by ground-fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) to protect against electric shock. Portable outdoor GFCIs can be purchased where electrical supplies are sold. GFCIs can also be installed permanently to household circuits by a qualified electrician.

# CANDLES AND OTHER DECORATIONS

- Use only non-combustible or flame-resistant materials to trim a tree. Choose tinsel or artificial icicles of plastic or nonleaded metals. Leaded materials are hazardous if ingested by children.
- Keep burning candles within sight.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or

- near other evergreens. Always use non-flammable holders, and place candles out of reach of children and pets.
- In homes with small children, take special care to avoid sharp or breakable decorations, keep trimmings with small removable parts out of the reach of children who could swallow or inhale small pieces, and avoid trimmings that resemble candy or food that may tempt a child to eat them.
- To avoid eye and skin irritation, wear gloves when decorating with spun glass "angel hair."
- To avoid lung irritation, follow container directions carefully while decorating with artificial snow sprays.

#### **FIREPLACES**

- Use care with "fire salts," which produce colored flames when thrown on wood fires. They contain heavy metals that, if eaten, can cause intense gastrointestinal irritation and vomiting. Keep them away from children.
- Do not burn wrapping papers in the fireplace. Wrappings can ignite suddenly and burn intensely, resulting in a flash fire.

The Pennsauken Sewerage Authority is responsible for the operation and maintenance of the sanitary sewerage collection system in our service area. The sanitary sewage collection system is made up of main lines, force mains and

pumping stations.

The homeowner owns and therefore responsible for the operation and maintenance of the lateral line from their dwelling up to and including the connection to the main line.

The rules and regulations of the Pennsauken Sewerage Authority require a back flow prevention device commonly referred to as a "back check value" be installed whenever plumbing fixtures are located below street level

such as in the basement. PSA strongly recommends all our customers have a back check value installed to prevent contamination in the event of a main line stoppage.

The discharge of water collected in a

sump pit to the sanitary sewage collection system is prohibited.

Cooking grease poured down the drain can cause a blockage of the lateral line. Please dispose of grease properly.



#### On The Web

As a child I'm sure everyone had their favorite holiday

treats around Christmas and Thanksgiving. For this month's article, I decided to highlight the delicious uniqueness of two personal favorites: pfeffernüsse (pronounced fef-er-noos-a) cookies and panettone bread.

Being from a multicultural background, my upbringing had international food perks galore. I can't remember the first time I had pfeffernüsse cookies, but every year since, it has been a staple holiday food item. Pfeffernüsse, or peppernut cookies, are a German spiced cookie covered in a frosted coating. The history of the cookie is unknown, but it is believed to be from the Netherlands; however, this cookie needs to be internationally known.

One of my favorite techniques when enjoying this cookie is to dip it in hot cocoa or coffee. The cookie is slightly soft and after dipping it, its frosty coating adds an extra hint of sweetness to the whole experience. I bought my first pack this year already. They normally go for around \$3 dollars per pack and are available at most major grocery stores.

My other holiday favorite is panettone bread. This is an Italian treat but does have a history in other regions of Europe, including Spain. Panettone is a sweet bread that has fruits and nuts baked inside of it. Some of you might be thinking, "FRUITCAKE!" but I assure you this is far from it. This sweet bread is soft and fluffy. It isn't messy and can be served a variety of ways. I normally just tear a piece off of the loaf, slather some

butter on it and enjoy. I know other people who will heat or toast theirs before putting butter on it. Lastly, try to control your excitement about this one: panettone French toast! You slice pieces off and dip and pan fry them just like you would with regular bread. It's heavenly and doesn't need much in the way of flavor enhancers because everything is already packed inside of it. Panettone can be found in a lot of places. Italian bakeries and major grocery stores normally carry this in varying sizes. The smaller loaves start at about \$5. These are also fantastic gifts if you're going to someone's house for dinner and want to bring something other than wine.



# When Pennsauken Was 125... It Was A Very Good Year

On behalf of the crew of your Public Works Department, I want to begin this article by extending our warmest wishes to our residents, businesses and their families for a great holiday season and a very Happy New Year. You may have realized through my writing of this column that I'll borrow some phrases for a catchy title for this otherwise mundane article. My favorite title will always remain February 2016: "Leave the Snow, take the Chocolates." Although our New Year's resolutions would have us exercise more and eat better, it's the intention that

counts! During the annual task of putting up the new calendar and filling in all of the birthdays, anniversaries and other anticipated dates, it gives us the opportunity to set some goals, based upon our experiences of the previous year.

As in most businesses, the end of a calendar year is a time where an organization can look back and evaluate its strengths and areas of improvement.

For those that have called, e-mailed or wrote to Public Works in the past year, you more than likely spoke with Rachael, our super-friendly and helpful full-time office clerk. Make no bones about it; she's the center point for all in-

coming and outgoing issue resolution procedures. Although our town had many highlights in 2017 that our department was involved with, such as a significant number of clean-ups and turn-over of abandoned homes; numerous food truck events; the Harvest Festival and 125th anniversary events; and the annual Holiday Parade and Tree Lighting Ceremony; I'd like to point out some of the Public Works accomplishments and goals that get me excited.

For the first time ever, Pennsauken's Department of Public Works has collected a year's worth of phone call, email, and walk-in data using a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet, as opposed to the piles of handwritten legal pads. It may not sound like much, but by tracking each resident's issue with date, time, issue category and resolution plan, both the Superintendent and myself can analyze any trends that need to be corrected dur-

ing the week and while planning for 2018. The single most beneficial aspect here is the tracking of trash complaints. Rachael can look back, instantly, to see if there's a particular dead-end or small street where trash or recycling is overlooked. This allows us to identify where Waste Management needs to focus their energies to compensate and correct the issue going forward.

If you have been to the parking lot at Tippin's Pond and walkway down to the dock, you will notice the new panoramic view of the pond. It was a week's worth of labor to remove, chip, and dispose of the various brush species we stumbled upon, not to mention the poison ivy and hornet nests! Next year will see continued expansion of the pond's view.

One of the more ambitious goals we have set out for early 2018 during the winter months, depending on snowfall, is a similar clearing of brush along the

stretch of Chestnut Ave. between 43rd and 36th streets. Although the property belongs to NJ Transit, the Township has identified this area as needing a "facelift," one that will improve the look of the neighborhood. This is approximately a half-mile of abandoned railroad bed, with a grade inclining the closer you get to the rail bridge over Route 130. Again, depending on the weather, we are planning to walk the brush back from the street's edge to the railroad ties over the winter for easier maintenance in the spring. There are other similar, smaller areas in town that we seek to tackle this winter as well. If we can knock all of those out, we can continue further on Chestnut Ave.

#### No Leaf Left Behind

I would be remiss to not mention that the Department of Public Works will continue to pick-up large leaf piles until Dec. 29. Those that bag their leaves can place them at the curb for Wednesday yard debris pickup by Waste Management throughout the year. 

gymnasium; extensive renovations at Pennsauken High School, with improvement being made to the auditorium, library, locker rooms, and gymnasium; construction of a plumbing lab, a new field house, and new tennis courts at the high school; and more.

"When the schools were originally built, security wasn't an issue. They were community schools. Today, security is a major issue and we have to address that in all of our schools," explains Billy Snyder, a teacher at Pennsauken High School. "We also need to position ourselves to compete with other schools. Twenty years ago, when I started to teach, there wasn't any real competition with public schools. We now have to compete with private schools, parochial

schools, other public schools. We have to - we have to do them better - and that area. We have to do that. We have to to choose Pennsauken."

"These changes will allow the Pennsauken School District to be a true powerhouse, providing a wide variety of opportunities for our students," adds Tarchichi.

the Longfellow site would be accessible to the local neighborhood and include a playground, walking path, gazebo, and pickleball courts. The high school track will be open to the community for walking; and the new field house and Roosevelt's gym will be available for local use. In addition, the proposed turf, multi-purpose field at the high school would also be available for youth football, soccer, and other tournaments, as well as band competitions under the lights.

The timing of this referendum couldn't be more beneficial, according to District officials. With the retirement of the bond debt from the building of Fine, Delair, and Intermediate schools, combined with state aid, the proposed bond referendum will actually reduce school taxes. For example, a resident with an assessed home of approximately \$140,000 will see a reduction of \$11.06; these savings take into account both the comprehensive improvements and the District's regular operating budget.

"We're dropping off a bond referendum that was done 20 years ago," explains Tarchichi. "We pay it off and replace it with a smaller referendum that impacts the entire district. That goes from pre-k all the way up to the high school."

"The issue is how can we do all this and not impact the taxpayers? The easiest way to do this is to put together a bond referendum, which encompasses improvements in all 13 schools," continues Nick Perry, president, Pennsauken Township Board of Education. "We're trying to improve our schools for the future. We also have to make sure that whatever we're doing is on solid financial ground. This bond referendum allows us to do both."

School officials went on to say that with improved facilities and new programs. overall student test scores will improve.

"The number one thing that schools are evaluated on is tests," explains Snyder. "Students do better when they're connected. This referendum is going to allow us to add programs that engage our students and make them more connected to their education. As a result, they're going to do better in school. And that means test scores are going to go up. You won't be teaching to the test; you'll be creating an environment where kids -whether they're looking to college or a career in a trade - are more excited to learn. That will ultimately lead to better test scores"

#### **Learn About The Referendum** On December 8

As part of an outreach to the community, the Pennsauken School District has planned several town hall meetings where the community can learn about the proposed bond referendum. The first of these will be a "Taste of Pennsauken" event on Friday, Dec. 8, 6:00 p.m. at the P.Y.A.A. Field House, 3501 Elm Ave. In addition to learning in detail about the proposed plans and the opportunity to ask questions about the initiative, the Pennsauken School District is taking the opportunity to recognize Rick Taylor, a member of Pennsauken Township Committee and a longtime educator who has made a significant impact for generations of Pennsauken students.

"Mr. Taylor is on my 'Mt. Rushmore' of Pennsauken," says Snyder. "It's really fitting that we take an opportunity to recognize what he's done for our community."

"It seems we all have a story about Mr. Taylor and how he's made a difference in our lives. It's great that we can do something to honor him," adds Jack Killion, Jr., a teacher at Howard M. Phifer Middle School."And for those who have questions about the referendum, come on out and ask them. We'll be more than happy to answer them so that you can make an informed decision."

# 1917: A Wartime Holiday Season In Our Community

A century ago, our community showed its

character as it observed the holidays in the absence of its Doughboys, both "over there" and over here. By the month of December 1917, more than 79 men of Pennsauken and Merchantville were in the military to serve in the Great War that had raged in Europe since 1914. Most of these were in training stateside. because America was not well prepared for war in 1917. President Wilson had just won re-election in part for having kept the U.S. out of the war when Germany's declaration of unrestricted submarine warfare and other factors changed that. Nevertheless, at least 25 local men had already entered the service before the end of April, when the United States declared war; and before the end of December, at least 28 were already in harm's way, in Europe or on the seas stalked by U-boats.

Those local residents who were already serving in the U.S. military by December 1917 included career soldiers and sailors, who were joined by many answering the call after the declaration of war. Among them were Corporal H. Rowland Gross, Herman King of the

Navy, and Percy Lincoln Hollinshed of the Marine Corps. These would be followed later by many more local volunteers and conscripted. Among these would be Anthony Forsthoffer, F.W. Grigg, Giovanni Veneziale, and Joseph Tinsman of the Army, as well as Albert Schleicher of the Ground Aviation Service. These were men who would not return home with their lives.

The First World War would ultimately prove apocalyptic for the old regimes of Europe and it would introduce the United States definitively to the world powers. It would also introduce new and devastating technology of death and destruction. Local men were among those to become familiar with this new technology, including Lawrence Cauffman, who joined the Aero Squadrons; Joseph Brooks, who became a crewman of the destroyer Aylwin, which hunted Uboats; Harry Sutton of Fish House, who trained for poison gas operations; and later Delair resident Joseph Angelo, who was assigned to the tank corps.

At home, the community tried to find a balance between their concern and fervor for the war and the reality of normal life. Conscription, war bonds, rationing and shortages, Red Cross work, and victory gardens soon began to feature in everyday life. Local newspapers began not only to cover the war more closely, but to publish columns of "trench slang," to help the folks back home follow the war and understand the letters they received from their boys over there.

Judge Frank T. Lloyd, a long-time local jurist and resident of Pennsauken, became the county chairman for the Red Cross drive that raised money and volunteers for war work in the fall and winter of 1917. He signed his letters of appeal, "In the name of our boys in France." Local units of the Red Cross began work to aid the effort. The Merchantville effort included a surgical dressings unit that worked to help fulfill the American Red Cross pledge of 3 million surgical dressings to be sent to France. In December in successive weeks, the women volunteers created 340,895, and 692 dressings prepared and packed for shipment before the suspension of activity for the holiday.

Local women served in more ways than one. Among the first to enter the military service in 1917 was Elizabeth Atkinson, who lived on 47th St. As a nurse, Elizabeth was badly needed when she enlisted in October; and she shipped

out in December to remain serving overseas until 1919.

Other Red Cross work included an appeal for feather beds and pillows to be converted into smaller, comfort pillows to send to the boys. Small wipes for eye wounds were being knitted by patriotic 12-year-old girls and "knitted helmets" were being produced by some ladies to send to the boys at Camp Dix in training.

Christmas boxes were also packed with warm clothing, candies, and other "good things" to be sent to the soldiers to let them know they were not forgotten. Wesley Rapp of town was among the recipients of such a holiday box, containing a warm sweater, which may have

been neither regulation nor necessary at his posting in San Antonio, Texas.

Realizing an omission in the needs of the soldier boys, local druggist Kohlerman arranged for a tobacco drive, donating a dozen pipes and pouches to fulfill "one of the very few comforts our boys over there can enjoy."

The more customary concerns of the holiday season were not entirely forgotten, although one appeal in the newspapers called on each woman involved in Red Cross work to not allow the holidays to "decrease the amount of her efforts on behalf of Uncle Sam." Both Gebhardt's drug store on Centre St. and



# **GOINGGREEN** Recovering Old Dining Room Chair Pads For The Holidays

The house is cleaned and decorated, the tree is up; stockings are hung awaiting Santa Claus. All ready for Christmas dinner, right? Everything except those old dining room chair pads. They are decades old, stained, and not so comfortable anymore since the padding has collapsed and lost its resiliency. Last month, I discussed ways to spruce up old wood furniture. Now, we will deal with those ratty old dining room chair pads.

Materials needed include 1" foam, upholstery batting, and upholstery material; upholstery material as opposed to clothing material is crucial to be long lasting

as folks sit on it. Get about 1.5 yards of each for four chairs, or 2 yards for six chairs if the dining room set comes with captain's chairs, also known as arm chairs. Tools needed for this project include a screwdriver, pliers, hammer, scissors, yardstick, tailor's chalk, and a heavy duty staple gun (stapler with compressor works best). There are many different types of staples; for this project, use narrow crown finishing staples, 1/4" across the top, by 5/8" long.

Once the materials and tools have been gathered, detach the chair pads by unscrewing them from underneath the chairs. Be sure to keep each pad with its chair, as screw holes differ slightly from

chair to chair. Next, turn one over, lift the material from the edge, and using the pliers, remove the old staples, loosening the old material and stuffing, and exposing the frame. Some staples may be too embedded in the frame, and very difficult to remove. In this case, use the hammer to gently tap them in to ensure they are level in the wood frame. Don't whack away at the frame, old chair frames can become brittle over time, so you don't want to break them.

Using the now clean frame as a template, cut new foam to fit the frame; then cut batting, leaving an extra 2" on each side of the batting to wrap around the edges. Place the foam on the top of the frame. Add the batting and turn it over, exposing the frame bottom, and slowly wrap the batting around the bottom edge of the chair frame. Starting in the middle of a side, staple as it's wrapped. Ensure the material stays centered around the frame to avoid a material shortage on one side. As a corner is reached, fold the material over the corner, then go back and fold down the edges. This will provide a neater corner finish. Cut away any

extra material, leaving at least a 1/2" border. Next, cut new upholstery material, leaving an extra 2" on each side to wrap around the bottom. If your upholstery material has a nap or pile, the nap needs to flow back to front. If the material has a unidirectional pattern, be sure to cut the material so the pattern is represented consistently for each chair. For example, striped material should all flow up and down, not side to side.

Fold the upholstery material underneath itself by 1/2" prior to stapling it to the frame, to create a finished look and reduce the chances of the material shredding over time. Staple through the fold, so the material doesn't unfold after stapling. Attach the corners before the sides are completely nailed down, the same as with the batting underneath. As each chair pad is finished, reattach it to the chair by screwing it to the frame, using the original screws if they are still in good shape. If new screws are used, get new screws consistent in size with the old ones.

This project may sound a bit complicated, but it's not that bad if you take your time and pay attention to the details. Once complete, and the newly reupholstered chairs are placed around the dining room table, they will be ready for more years of holiday dinner guests to eat, drink, and talk of family traditions.

# Pennsauken Lions Provides Free Eye Screenings To Over 300 Children

Pennsauken Lions Club president Ely Mateo, as well as members July DiAmore and Mary Anne McFarland, recently went to Pennsauken public elementary schools,

St. Cecilia School, Little Angels Day-

care, and Merchantville Elementary

School to help conduct eye screenings for the pre-k and kindergarten students.

In total, 382 kids were screened over three weeks. Ninety-six of these children will need further exam and possibly glasses. Those children's families were sent letters with the findings from the amazing camera, which identifies 23 different issues with the eyes. Those issues include astigmatism, near and far sightedness, uneven power of the eyes, gaze issues, and lazy eye, amongst other things. The families were referred to the school nurse if they could not afford to take their child to an eye doctor. The school nurses have referral forms for the

South Jersey Eye Center, which offers low or no-cost exams and glasses. If needed, the Lions Club will cover any costs. The Lions would like to expand their screenings next year to other day care facilities and schools in Pennsauken. The screenings are free; all the parents or guardians need to do is fill out the permission slip. While the Lions screened more kids than last year, they still would like to get closer to 100 percent of the pre-k and kindergarten students.

The Lions Club's eveglass "mailbox." which sits by the entrance of the Township's municipal complex at 5605 N. Crescent Blvd., was recently refurbished by two club members. It now has a phone number on it for residents to call if the box appears full when you try to drop glasses off. So far this year, the Lions have collected over 600 pair of glasses through the mailbox. If you have clear prescription glasses (no sunglasses please) you'd like to donate, take them from the case and place them in a clear sandwich bag and drop them the box. The box will be checked periodically and the glasses will be sent to the sorting

Coal became an important resource to the war effort and subject to government administration for its civilian use. It was reported at the beginning of December that not one ounce of coal could be found in local coal yards from Pavonia in Camden to Moorestown. Local coal dealer Walter H. Eastlack made an appeal to the state for relief; but shortly

after, the two cars of coal that had arrived were long since claimed. When a cold snap came, the boiler in Grace Episcopal Church cracked and night services had to be cancelled. Local families began to gather in one or two rooms of their homes and heat them with gaslights, causing gas pressure to lessen to the point that one could not read a newspaper by the light cast. Nevertheless, the civilian population accepted their own sacrifices so the boys in uniform would have what they needed.

The Christmas services of 1917 with choirs and cantatas: community celebrations with parties and dances; and family gatherings with feasts and gifts, gave way to the New Year's celebrations. Local folks praying for the year to come adjusted to absences and drew together. The worst of the war still lay ahead: the first casualties, boys who would never return home, and even a terrible epidemic of disease. For now, however, in this only holiday season of the Great War for America, the home front endured.
