Pennsauken's celebration of the holidays continues with two special events held this month: the town's annual tree lighting ceremony and parade of lights.

Tree Lighting Held On December 5

Pennsauken Township's tree lighting ceremony returns on Wednesday, Dec. 5, from 5:00 to 7:30 p.m. at the Township Municipal Complex, 5605 N. Crescent Blvd. The evergreen tree outside of the Municipal Building will be ornately decorated for the holidays; and several food trucks will be on hand for attendees to enjoy something to eat during the event. The Philadelphia Eagles Pep Band will be on hand to provide musical entertainment. There will be costumed characters and Santa Claus will arrive via fire engine at 6:00 p.m. to light the tree. Residents are encouraged to bring their phones and cameras, as Santa will be available for photos with children after the tree lighting. A trackless train will shuttle attendees to visit Saint Nicholas. There is

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Pennsauken's JapStar Imports Serves Niche Market For Car Enthusiasts

A Pennsauken business tucked away off of Rt. 130 is focusing on a niche market for car enthusiasts: Japanese imports that were never meant for the U.S. market.

According to owner Alex Arcona, JapStar Imports, the company averages in six to ten Japanese imports a month.

"Three years ago, we started getting bigger shipments and more cars," says

Arcona.

Alex went on to explain that there are a lot of cars from Japan that were never sold in the United States, vehicles like the Nissan Skyline GTR. And as part of a

law enacted by Congress in 1988, auto enthusiasts looking to import a car never meant for the U.S. market have to wait 25 years to the month from when a vehicle was initially manufactured. That means they're importing Japanese-made cars and trucks first manufactured in 1994 or older. Despite their age, these special Japanese imports are still extremely reliable.

"It's a specialty market, not for the everyday consumer," says Arcona. "All of our imported cars have steering wheels on the right side. It's pretty niche."

The vehicles are shipped to the U.S. in large containers. JapStar picks them up from the port in either Baltimore or Newark. They do full maintenance, as well as interior and exterior cosmetic repairs and a full detail. The entire process - from purchase to maintenance - takes about a month and a half to two months.

JapStar Imports has an inventory of around 30 vehicles, as well as special orders. Most cars have a price range of anywhere between \$7.000 and \$15.000: while street legal UTVs, also known as "little trucks," are around \$4,500.

"We pride ourselves on customer service," says Arcona. "We offer good vehicles at competitive prices."

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PEOPLEIN THE NEWS Dr. Valerie Tutwiler Researching New Ways To Treat Blood Clots

Research undertaken by a Pennsauken native is changing the way scientists identify and treat abnormal blood clots.

Dr. Valerie Tutwiler, Ph.D., grew up in Pennsauken, attending St. Stephen's School and enjoyed playing sports for P.Y.A.A. and performing in pop up plays for P.A.P.A. Today, Tutwiler, a post-doctoral fellow in hemostasis and thrombosis at the Perlman School of Medicine, University of Pennsylvania, has focused her research on the types of blood clots that lead to serious medical conditions.

"I was always interested in cardio vascular and heart

related research, especially after my grandmother had a heart attack when I

was younger," says Tutwiler. "It wasn't until my co-op through Drexel University at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia's hematology lab that I started looking at the blood side of things."

Dr. Tutwiler explained that normally, blood clots are part of the body's healing process. It's only when blood clots occur in places where they shouldn't be that they can cause major health problems.

"We're looking at the structure and

mechanics of blood clots, how they create conditions that lead to issues such as heart attacks and stroke," says Tutwiler. "By looking at how the disease develops, we can research new solutions on how they can be treated."

During the fall, Dr. Tutwiler traveled to Morristown Hospital in Wales and presented to researchers about new techniques to detect abnormal clotting in blood in patients arriving in their emergency rooms with illnesses including strokes, heart disease, and respiratory conditions. It's part of the process to create scientific collaboration and collect more data through additional research.

"We're expanding the types of population that we're looking at for this one aspect of blood clotting, but we're also expanding the directions we're going in," says Tutwiler. "It's an ongoing project and we're looking forward to seeing the results."

Pennsauken Native's Artwork Selected For Project Mars Challenge

The artwork of Pennsauken native Dominique Evans, currently studying at Moore College of Art and Design in Philadelphia, was recently selected as a finalist for the Project Mars Challenge. Co-sponsored by NASA and SciArt Exchange, college students and early career professionals communicate their visual interpretation of NASA's deep space journey from Earth to Mars.

Participants learned about NASA's deep space exploration efforts, including the agency's Orion spacecraft, space launch system rocket and gateway planned near the Moon, and create their vision of what NASA's leadership in deep space will look like.

Entries included film and poster submissions that envisioned NASA's missions and what astronauts might see, feel and experience on those missions.

Evans' artwork, "Two Worlds," was selected from out of 600 entries as a third place finalist.

Entries were judged by a stellar team of film and graphic industry professionals, as well as NASA astronauts.



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
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Pyne-Bailey Attends Leadership Conference

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



Looking At The Big Picture Regarding Rental Properties

A few months ago, we communicated changes being made to the Township's rental property program. We wanted to share where we are with the transformation of the program and some of the updates that have happened since our initial announcement.

There were three things within our program that needed updating. First was the registration fee; the second was the property maintenance standards; and third was the automation of the overall program.

We have already addressed the registration fee, taking it to \$350 per year per property. Patte Magro, our Township

rental coordinator; John Kneib, our Township administrator; the members of Township Committee; as well as myself, have all met with or spoken to many landlords regarding their concerns over the increase. After going through the information and discussing the basis for the increase, there was a clear understanding as to why the Township took this step. It comes down to the cost of doing business and to ensure the program is fair and equitable for "ALL" of the Townships residents.

Property maintenance was the second concern. Pennsauken Township has over 1,000 rental properties. The better majority of the landlords are good people who register their properties every year;

get the necessary inspections to make sure that their properties are safe and secure; and do a beautiful job of ensuring great pride and care is shown to people driving through our town. Likewise for the tenants who live there. But not everyone is as diligent in ensuring the same standards. The adjustments made to the maintenance section of the ordinance have been changed to include accountability to not only the landlord, but also the tenant. Going forward, if a notice of violation is sent to the owner of a rental property, the same notice will also be sent to the tenant. This ensures that both parties responsible for the upkeep and maintenance of a property are notified and accountable to the same standards as our residents. At the end of the day tenant, resident, or landlord, we all have a stake in how our town is perceived both internally and externally.

The automation of this program was paramount. Getting this done would free up Patte's time and enable her to focus on the enforcement of the program, holding all responsible parties accountable. So starting this month, the rental registration program will be set up as an online registration process, accessible through our Township's website, twp.pennsauken.nj.us. You can access the link by going onto the website under online forms, and then landlord registra-

tions (soon to be called rental property registration). If you do not have access to a computer, or if you need assistance in getting your first registration completed, please call Patte Magro, the Township's rental coordinator, at (856) 663-0514; she'll be happy to assist you in getting your registration completed.

Another big benefit of the online registration program is that it cross pollinates with the vacant property registration program through the ProChamps software we use. We will be able to share information across programs to identify properties that may be in foreclosure but have been turned into rental properties, or rental properties in foreclosure that may soon be going vacant.

In closing, I had the pleasure of speaking with some of the members of the Pennsauken's Republican Party last month. The discussion was focused on information pertaining to the foreclosed, vacant and abandoned property program, where we were, where we are now, and what are the next steps for that program. At the closing of that discussion, I asked the group for a favor. Everyone is on some form of social media today. Thoughts and opinions are shared and conclusions are drawn. Unfortunately, many times those conclusions are drawn based on opinions rather than factual information or from interpretations instead of fact-based conversations. So the favor I asked was this: please do not believe everything you read on Facebook or any social media site. Get the facts for yourself. If you have a question or concern about something the Township is doing, or if you read or hear something that you want information about, call in and get the information you need.

I receive many calls from residents regarding vacant properties. They provide all kinds of information that only they can share because they live next to or near an abandoned or vacant property. This information is invaluable to getting the property taken care of. Resolving the issues that concern our residents is our primary responsibility. We work hard to get things done as quickly as the system will allow us. The problem will get resolved much faster with a phone call rather than a post.



Keep Homes Safe During Holidays With Safety Tips For Decorating

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) is issuing safety tips for holiday decorations. Holiday decorations, like candles, lights and Christmas trees, add a joyous and festive mood to the holiday season. But when these decorations are not used properly, they can cause fires, injuries and death.

Each year, hospital emergency rooms treat about 12,500 people for falls, cuts, shocks, and burns due to incidents involving faulty holiday lights, dried-out Christmas trees and other holiday decorations.

To prevent these injuries, CPSC monitors holiday lights and other decorations sold at stores and on the Internet. CPSC works with the Bureau of Customs and Border Protection to identify and detain unsafe holiday light sets posing fire risks

from being distributed in the U.S.

Christmas trees are involved in about 300 fires annually, resulting in 10 deaths, 30 injuries and an average of about \$10 million in property damage and loss. In addition, there are more than 13,000 candle-related fires each year, which result in 140 deaths and \$205 million in property loss.

"The flickering light of candles can add beauty and tradition to the holidays," said CPSC Chairman Ann Marie Buerkle. "However, when left unattended or within a child's reach, burning candles can turn your celebration into tragedy. Following a few simple safety tips can help prevent holiday decoration-related fires."

CPSC suggests following these tips to make your holiday a safe one.

TREES

 When purchasing an artificial tree, look for the label "Fire Resistant." Although this label does not mean the tree won't catch fire, it does indicate the tree is more resistant to burning.

 When purchasing a live tree, check for freshness. A fresh tree is green, needles are hard to pull from branches and do not break when bent between your fingers. The trunk butt of a fresh tree is sticky with resin, and when tapped on the ground, the tree should not lose many needles.

 When setting up a tree at home, place it away from fireplaces and radiators. Because heated rooms dry live trees out rapidly, be sure to keep the stand filled with water. Place the tree out of the way of traffic and do not block doorways.

LIGHTS

• Indoors or outside, use only lights that have been tested for safety by a recognized testing laboratory, such as UL or ETL. This indicates conformance with safety standards. Use only lights that have plugs containing fuses.

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
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GOINGGREEN Remembering The Tradition Of Bayberry Candles

As the holiday season approaches, I find myself reminiscing about Christmases past. Dragging boxes out of the attic to decorate the house and yard; trimming the tree; and hanging stockings in preparation for Santa's arrival.

One of my family's traditions was lighting a bayberry candle each Christmas Eve. A bayberry candle is a strongly scented olive colored candle made from a species of bayberry shrub that grows abundantly in North America. First made by early colonists who boiled bayberries to get the wax, bayberry candles are considered by many to be the original scented candles in America. Real bayberry candles are made with pure bayberry wax mixed with a hint of beeswax for stability.

When the first settlers arrived on our shores, every moment was one of survival. Everything was in short supply, including candles, which were the primary source of light after dark in the days before electricity. In colonial times, candles were made of tallow (animal fat) which tends to smoke and give off an odor, especially if they had become rancid.

Innovative homemakers discovered that the abundant bayberry bush had berries that would give off a waxy residue when boiled. They learned to collect and save the bayberry wax that would rise to the surface of the water and make them into tapered candles. Bayberry tapers burned longer and cleaner than the tallow version. However, pure bayberry wax tends to be brittle, so candle-makers mixed the wax with beeswax to help them hold their shape and not fracture.

It takes a lot of bayberries to make enough wax to make a single taper. These Bayberry tapers were a real treasure to the colonists, who saved them for special occasions. Bayberry candles were a luxury to be relished. The scarcity and value of bayberry wax fueled the traditions that grew up around its use during the darkest days of the year. Originally used by colonists, it has become a tradition to burn a bayberry candle on winter nights, in hopes of health and prosperity in the coming year.

The ritual that originally developed around bayberry candles began as a Christmas Eve or New Year's Eve tra-

dition. During those special nights, a bayberry candle was burned - and it had to be timed to stay lit until after midnight to bring a year of prosperity and good fortune to the household. The candle could not be extinguished; it had to be allowed to burn out on its own. If the candle burned down to the socket, abundance for the coming year would bless everyone participating in the ritual.

Over the years, the burning of bayberry candles on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve became a tradition.creating a saying whose origins have been lost to time, yet the tradition continues today. The gift of a bayberry candle is an invitation to participate in the holiday ritual. Lighting a symbolic bayberry candle calls for a recitation of the legendary

friend, so on Christmas Eve, burn it down to the end. For a bayberry candle. burned to the socket, will bring joy to the heart and gold to the pocket."

A slightly different version of the invocation delivers the same message:

"A bayberry candle burned to the socket brings luck to the household, food to the larder, and gold to the

A genuine bayberry candle won't give off a powerful perfume – those are artificially perfumed candles - but will emit its fragrance most noticeably when it goes out or is snuffed out. In this season of giving, remember to share family traditions with loved ones, to keep memories of those who have gone before us alive.

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

Unlike most gifts, puppies and kittens cannot be returned. Before you go to the pet store, breeder, or shelter, there are some things you should consider.

Never give a pet as a surprise. Pets are a wonderful addition to life, yet not everyone has the time, energy or money to care for one. You may think a friend or family member is lonely and the pet will be good company, but you need to know if this is something the person wants and can handle at this time.

Avoid impulsive decisions regarding the addition of a pet. Adding a pet to your home or to someone else's is not something you should do on a whim. 

- Check each set of lights, new or old, for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires, or loose connections. Throw out damaged sets. Always replace burned-out bulbs promptly with the same wattage bulbs.
- If using an extension cord, make sure it is rated for the intended use.
- Never use electric lights on a metallic tree. The tree can become charged with electricity from faulty lights, and a person touching a branch could be electrocuted.
- Before using lights outdoors, check labels to be sure they have been certified for outdoor use.
- Stay away from power or feeder lines leading from utility poles into older
- Fasten outdoor lights securely to trees, house walls, or other firm supports to protect the lights from wind damage. Use only insulated staples (not nails or tacks) to hold strings in place. Or, run strings of lights through hooks (available at hardware stores).

to bed or leave the house. The lights could short out and start a fire.

- Use caution when removing outdoor holiday lights. Never pull or tug on lights - this could cause stress on the connections that could create a fire hazard.
- Outdoor electric lights and decorations should be plugged into circuits protected by ground-fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) to protect against electric shock. Portable outdoor GFCIs can be purchased where electrical supplies are sold. GFCIs can also be installed permanently to household circuits by a qualified electrician.

CANDLES AND OTHER **DECORATIONS**

- Use only non-combustible or flame-resistant materials to trim a tree. Choose tinsel or artificial icicles of plastic or nonleaded metals. Leaded materials are hazardous if ingested by children.
- Keep burning candles within sight.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near other evergreens. Always use

- In homes with small children, take special care to avoid sharp or breakable decorations, keep trimmings with small removable parts out of the reach of children who could swallow or inhale small pieces, and avoid trimmings that resemble candy or food that may tempt a child to eat them.
- To avoid eve and skin irritation, wear gloves when decorating with spun glass "angel hair."
- To avoid lung irritation, follow container directions carefully while decorating with artificial snow sprays.

FIREPLACES

- Use care with "fire salts," which produce colored flames when thrown on wood fires. They contain heavy metals that, if eaten, can cause intense gastrointestinal irritation and vomiting. Keep them away from children.
- Do not burn wrapping papers in the fireplace. Wrappings can ignite suddenly and burn intensely, resulting in a flash fire.

Happy holidays everyone! This has been a year of some truly great eats and treats. We ventured to Casani Candy Company; munched French fries at House of Pizza, Montegrillo's and Gaetano's Steaks; transported to Africa at the Lizzyboat African Market; and got some amazing brisket at Back Alley Barbeque.

For my final article of 2018, I wanted to highlight a cultural tradition called the Feast of the Seven Fishes or "Festa dei sette pesci" in Italian. This is an Italian/Roman Catholic tradition of not

eating meat on Christmas Eve. Instead, people feast on dishes made only with fish and other popular seafood. There is no limit to only seven dishes and Italian families often serve up to 13 different dishes at the grand meal.

Most traditional Seven Fishes feast include salted cod known as baccalá, whiting and lemon, mussels or clams in pasta, fried smelt, and calamari. The list could go on to include crab, lobster, shrimp, and other sea fare.

The number seven doesn't have a specific origin but some have said that, this being a religious holiday, the number comes from the Bible, as it's used more than any other number in the book. There

are other theories that claim it comes from the number of sacraments, but these all vary amongst Italian families.

You can find traditional Seven Fishes recipes everywhere online. There are also places in town where you can get fresh fish and other seafood, or purchase pre-made dishes. Here are some great places to do your shopping.
